Designer has his hands full setting stage for ambitious ACT 1 season

Trinidad to the Pacific Northwest has been an exercise in "expanding what I know."

Most of that expansion has come through his

steady and varied involvement in theater, which makes its most recent advance with the opening next month of the 2017-18 season of Puyallup's ACT1 Theatre Productions.

He will be designing sets for all five of the plays this season, beginning with *The Best Christmas Pageant* — *Ever*, opening at

the Liberty Theater on Dec. 1.

That will be followed over the next six months with an adaptation of *Romeo and Juliet*, *Charlotte's Web*, *Vanya and Sonia and Masha and Spike*, and *Urinetown*.

As each brings its distinct design challenges, Tice sees ample opportunity for continued expansion.

For example, *Christmas Pageant* calls for a duel set that allows the play's action to move between the living room of the Herdman family home and the interior of the church where the pageant takes place.

Rotating pieces of scenery present stainedglass windows on one side and interior walls on the residence on the other. An altar in the church becomes a table in the house.

One specific challenge with the stainedglass pieces, was blocking a view from inside the church, while simultaneously creating the effect of light passing through from the outside.

By researching websites, Tice came up with a type and shade of paint that creates that desired illusion.

Another problem came with the absence of coat hooks on the house interior walls, calling for creation of appropriate spaces where coats could be dropped as an alternative.

Then came the realization that access to the Liberty Theater for actual construction of the set would not be available until a week before opening night. Tice plans to get some of the pieces ready for installation elsewhere and moved onto the stage in that final week. But he also plans to be building and painting on stage at the same time.

In this play, as well as the others throughout this season, he will be drawing from some 12 years' experience of not only set-designing, but acting, directing, producing, costuming and dance.

Much of this varied experience was accumulated at Pacific Lutheran University where he graduated in 2015 with a bachelor's of Fine Arts degree in acting and directing.

Before that he received a diploma in environmental science and theater from Fyzabad Composite School in Trinidad. and, since PLU, he has worked extensively with ACT1 Theatre, as well as with Taproot and Village theatres in the Seattle area.

ACT1 audiences got a rich look at both his directing and designing skills with the production in Sumner last year of *Treasure Island*, which Tice set in a Caribbean island, not unlike his homeland.

Whatever his particular role in any production, Tice recognizes and appreciates the collaboration among those involved in pulling it together.

For example, his set design will influence the actor's movements in accordance with the blocking introduced during rehearsal by Director Abbey Homan.

During the two weeks that the play is produced, the interaction of all those involved may lead to even more alterations, expanding further what Tice and the others "come to know."

Chaos to sensibility

First-time ever director trying to make this The Best Christmas Pageant

s the curtain came down on the final week of October, 16 aspiring actors, ages 6 to 16, took tentative steps toward a theater career under the watchful eye of a new director.

Their stage was the meeting room at the Bowman-Hilton Community Club in east Puyallup.

There, against a vibrant backdrop of fall leaves appearing through the windows from the trees outside, they began rehearsing.

Their play is *The Best Christmas Pageant Ever*, the opening production of ACT1 Theatre's 2017-18 season. It opens Dec. 1 for two, weekends at Puyallup's historic Liberty Theater.

For several of the young actors this would be their first experience working with a director, other actors and a script.

The director, Abbey Homan, in her sixth year of theater involvement, describes her previous five years as a process of discovery.

The Eatonville native was graduated last year from Eastern Washington University a major in theater. She has

learned in her short-time involvement not only the workings of theater and those who create it, but she has come to realize how much it all means to her.

Now, working with these young actors and the five adults who round out the cast, her progression takes a new turn: Directing on her own.

In one corner of this fall-afternoon rehearsal, the five-member "angel choir" practices Christmas carols as the cast members become familiar with the script and each other.

Homan acknowledges the directing challenges that await her: the actors' short attention spans, the lack of familiarity with scripts and the underlying task for all involved of translating text into performance.

One part of the story they are to tell is the familiar biblical tale of the Christ child in a manger, joined by shepherds, wise men and all that.

The other part is the far-less familiar tale of the unruly, unholy Herdman family and their unlikely involvement in the local church's annual Christmas pageant.

Only by chance have the Herdman children been encouraged to take part in the

pageant — much to the dismay of nearly everyone else.

So, it's the original Christmas story, but not just the original Christmas story.

Early on, Homan hands to her young cast the task of creating character, within their roles in the play, especially the children in the Herdman family.

Taking their director's cue, the actors discuss how disruptive children would behave. How would they look? How would they sound?

At the same time, she looks for and finds among the older youngsters and adults a willingness to work with the younger ones.

"This is how the real passions for theater are passed on," Homan said.

On this fall day, the opening of the play in December seems a long way off. But limited early access to the Liberty Theater, and the inexperience of so many on and off the stage have created a sense of urgency for all.

Homan sees it as a reflection of the play itself. She characterizes *The Best Christmas Pageant Ever* as not so much a religious play, but rather a universal lesson in seeing things from different points of view. In the play, the Herdman children step from a world of disruptiveness into one of collaboration and caring.

"It's an interesting concept," Homan said. "Chaos to sensibility."
